### Bio

Ker Wallwork is a London based artist working in text, moving image, drawing, and sculpture. Their work is concerned with miscommunication, looking at signs and signals from a cellular to a societal level. Playing with symbolism and materiality, elements from queer and crip theory, environmental sciences, historical art and design, and contemporary media are combined to suggest disordered, and often humorous, narratives.

Their current work is focused on the impact of a decade of austerity as a form of ongoing, bureaucratised violence, particularly in relation to reforms of the benefit system for sick and disabled people, using their focus to explore the value and limits of symbolic acts of resistance and solidarity within an increasingly unequal political system.
